





What I Need to Know


Welcome to another exciting lesson in English 2. You will be learning some strategies that will help you enhance your reading and comprehension skills. These strategies are important to the development of your knowledge in the English Language particularly in understanding illustrations of a reading material and eventually its texts.

At the end of this module, you will be able to do the following:

- 1. Discuss the illustrations on the cover of a book or any reading material.
 - 2. Predict what the story may be.



Look at the pictures below. Identify the picture and write a sentence for each.





Congratulations! You have just finished answering the activity on writing a sentence about a picture. As we go over, you will see a book cover of the story "The Playful Piggy."

After looking into the book cover, you will meet questions that you need to answer.



Questions:

- 1. What do you see in the book's cover?
- 2. What is the title of the story?
- 3. Seeing the illustrations in the book's cover, what do you think this story is about?



Based on the book cover presented, you were asked:

1. What do you see in the book's cover? **Answer: I see a pig.**

2. What is the title of the story?

Answer: The Playful Piggy

3. Seeing the illustrations in the book's cover, what do you think the story is about?

Answer: I think the story is about a pig who is very playful.

A **book cover** is the protective covering used to bind together the pages of a book. Its illustrations create a visual representation for conveying message to help the reader understand better and eventually make predictions.


Predicting – is the process of using text clues and prior knowledge in order to anticipate what is going to happen next in the story.

As you can see, the story was not yet presented. But you were able to discuss something about the story with only the illustrated cover through your answers to the questions above, and even made prediction of what the story may be.

Let's have a practice of the above skill you just learned by studying another book cover below. Answer the questions that follow.




Questions:
