





#### Are these Mine, Yours, Hers or His?

Oh Ben, is this guava yours? Ben, oh Ben, is this flower yours? Ben, is this bean yours?

Oh, Lina, is this guava yours? Lina, oh Lina, is this flower yours? Lina, is this bean yours?

Ben owns the guava. It is his. Lina owns the flower. It is hers. And I own the bean. It is mine.

# What is it

A **possessive pronoun** can be used alone. **It's mine.** It shows ownership. They tell the reader that something belongs to somebody or something.

These are the possessive pronouns and the subjects they represent:

Subject	Possessive Pronoun
	Mine
You (singular)	Yours
Не	His
She	Hers
I†	Its
We	Ours
They	Theirs

Look at these sentences.

- 1. I own the bean. It is **mine**.
- 2. We love the garden. It is **ours.**
- 3. Ben, is this your bean? No, it is yours.
- 4. Ben owns the guava. It is his.
- 5. Ling owns the flower. It is hers.
- 6. Ben and Lina owns a big garden. It is theirs.

In the first sentence, I own the bean. It is **mine**. The word **mine** means that the bean belongs to me.

In the second sentence, we love the garden. It is **ours**. The word **ours** means that the garden belongs to us.

In the third sentence, Ben, is this your bean? No, it is **yours**. The word **yours** means that the bean belongs to the person spoken to.

In the fourth sentence, Ben owns the guava. It is **his**. The word **his** means that the guava belongs to Ben, a boy.

In the fifth sentence, Lina owns the flower. It is **hers**. The word **hers** means that the flower belongs to Lina, a girl.

In the last sentence, Ben and Lina owns a big garden. It is **theirs.** The word **theirs** means that the big garden belongs to Ben and Lina.

#### Remember:

Possessive pronouns show ownership.

We use **his**, when the owner is a boy.

We use **hers**, when the owner is a girl.

We use **mine**, when the owner is the speaker.

We use ours, when the speaker is one of the owners.

We use **yours**, when the owner is the person you are speaking to.

We use **theirs**, when the owners are boys or/and girls you are speaking about.

They are usually placed **after the verb** or at the **end** of the sentence.
